
Potential Consequences of Dam Abandonment:

Timeline of Key Events (Part 1)

July - September 2024:

- Formation of 5 Town Dam Committee:
 - Coordinated messaging and biweekly updates
 - Initiated impact assessments
 - Explored ownership solutions
- Bucksport: Passed Dam Abandonment Ordinance
- Orland: Enacted 180-day Moratorium

Timeline of Key Events (Part 2)

October - December 2024

- Oct 19: Bucksport Mill LLC submitted 2nd application to ME DEP
- Nov 1: DEP accepted petition
- By Dec 13: All 5 municipalities completed town votes required to pursue potential ownership discussions

Public Consultation Status

November 14, 2024 Public Meeting

- Limited public exchange (3-minute questions)
- Responses posted to bucksportmillanswers.com.
- Note: Meeting did not constitute formal town consultation.

Required Legal Steps for Abandonment

Consultation Requirements (38 M.R.S. § 902(3))

- Individual/Group consultation
- Municipality consultation
- Owner reports to DEP late April on consultation status
- DEP granted 180-day extension until October 2025
- State agency evaluation if no owner found

Review by 3 State Agencies

60 days to determine if ownership is warranted

Will weigh costs of dam maintenance and public value

- Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife
- Department of Agriculture Conservation and Forestry
- Maine Emergency Management Agency


Additional Legislative Initiatives

Key Considerations:

- Legislation to create Quasi-Municipal Watershed Protection Districts
- Governed by an appointed or elected board
- Funded by town contributions, property owners' assessments, or both
- Authority to own, operate and renovate Toddy Pond Dam
- Implementation will require voter approval
